





Per the last few months, anybody have any rare and crazy/unique box arts to add for the next issues?





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

Classic '60s Model Car Box Art

Model car kit box art from the '60s is one of the most overlooked styles of American illustration—except by hot rodders.

The level of model building has never been higher than it is today. The perfection and level of detail in the models that I see at shows blows me away—and puts to shame the gluey, fingerprint-marred cars I loved building 50 years ago. Granted, I was just a kid, and our basement wasn't well ventilated, and 100 other excuses for why my plastic hot rods didn't look like today's masterpieces. Nevertheless, I couldn't stop building them. I blame it on the box art.

<u>Related: Classic '60s Model Car Box Art, Part 2</u> Back then, the outsides of model kit boxes featured fabulous and exciting illustrations of the street rods and race cars that were replicated, in unpainted 1:24scale pieces of plastic, on the inside. There they were, belching flames, laying rubber, and pulling wheelies at the dragstrip. What kid could resist? Not me. Maybe not you. The artwork that once compelled us to spend a week's lunch money on a model, we now appreciate at a different level, but with just as much excitement.

Nobody appreciates this stuff more than automotive journalist, TV host, hot rod and model builder Steve Magnante. Except for maybe model kit collector and historian Mark Lewis. A few years ago, Magnante and Lewis met up to talk about model kits and box art. The highlights of that conversation were presented in a feature article in *Elapsed Times* magazine, part of which is presented here. We will have more soon. Enjoy.

1965 Pontiac Grand Prix



Mark Lewis: "This 1965 Pontiac Grand Prix kit by AMT [kit T322-200] is one of the rarest model car kits in existence. When I say that, I'm not talking about the plastic parts inside-they've been released in numerous other boxes—but rather the box art illustration is what makes it special. It was issued in 1969 as part of the AMT All American Show and Go series. In 30 years of collecting, I've only seen two of these." So why would AMT re-release a '65 Pontiac kit in 1969? Money, baby, money. The product planners knew the kit was popular the first time around and so re-released it a few years later with catchy, new box art and decals. Here, we're grooving on the nighttime drive-in scene (signed by artist Larry Champine), depicting the owner bragging up his blown 421 mill before a street race. The door art (and decal sheet) reads "Funny Farmer"a clear reference to Pontiac drag star Arnie Beswick.

Mach Won Mustang



When AMT's Mach Won flip-top Funny Car kit hit the shelves in late 1970, Ford's Mach 1 Mustang

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performance package had only been on the street for two years, but it was already a legend among kids of all ages. The only build choice was the Logghe tube chassis, GMC supercharged 427 SOHC, and one-piece flip-top Mustang body shell. This neat kit has never been re-released, but with the extremely hip Tom Lowe in charge of Round Two models—the keeper of vintage AMT and MPC model-kit tooling—we can realistically hope for a re-pop, assuming the tooling still exists.

Hurst Hemi Under Glass



Another instance where the plastic parts have been rereleased frequently is evident in this original issue of the Hurst Hemi Under Glass '66 Barracuda wheelstander by AMT (kit 6776-150). First released in late 1966, it gave kids an inside look at one of the day's most popular exhibition drag machines. After Hurst paired with MPC in 1968, Hurst-less AMT continued to produce this kit with alternate box art and decals depicting fictional wheelie cars like the Hemi Hustler and Mad Mackerel. The plastic bits have recently been re-released by the Model King and RC2 Models for under \$30, but not with this box art!

Shelby Dream Team



Slap the Shelby name on anything, and you've got a surefire collector's item. And so it is with the AMT Shelby Drag Team (kit T501-500) of 1969. AMT has released similar value-added kits (two or even three models in one box) since the early '60s. The 500 suffix on the part number tells us the suggested retail price was \$5. In the case of the Shelby Drag Team, the box contained a '68 Shelby GT500 that could be built stock, custom, or drag; a '69 Ford Galaxie that also had multiple build options; and a two-axle open car trailer that'd been offered in various AMT kits since 1962. Again, each of the plastic kits in this item has been rereleased numerous times but never with the Shelby box art, decal sheet, and diorama panel.

Dodge Fever Bee



Funny Car model kits were hugely popular with kids in the '60s, and MPC was actively gunning for a chunk of their paper route money with tempting offerings like the Fever Bee '68 Dodge Super Bee (kit 706-200). Though the body shell is the same stock shell used in other MPC Super Bee kits in 1968 (and not massaged for Funny Car service), the only build option here was a Logghe-style tube-frame Funny Car. Parts for a stock version were not included, though the kit's Hemi could be assembled with a "fuel-burning" 6-71 blower or "gas-burning" Hilborn fuel injection. Mark says the fictional Fever Bee is part of MPC's 700-series, which depicted mostly Funny Cars and was very well engineered with high realism and easy assembly.

Mr. Speed Studebaker



Speaking of flip-top Funny Cars that never were, the AMT Mr. Speed Studebaker (kit 6773-150) was the hasty result of product planners' desire to add FC kits to the 1968 new product catalog as cheaply as possible. Again, this one is pure fantasy and has no real-world counterpart. That said, it portrays a very cool midengine match racer in the spirit of Tom McEwen's Hemi 'Cuda. In fact, the exotic 392 Hemi-powered, tube-frame chassis was originally tooled by AMT as part of its '66 Piranha mid-engine dragster kit. Conveniently, the body shell of the AMT '53 Studebaker Starliner Coupe kit has the same wheelbase as that on the Piranha, so mating elements of the two kits to create the Mr. Speed kit was a simple process. The only newly tooled parts were a body-hinge assembly and prop rod for displaying the raised body.

Indy Drag Combo



The AMT Indy Drag Combo of 1968 (kit T357-300) included a '63 Nova wagon crew car, altered wheelbase '65 Chevy II, and the same dual-axle open-car trailer offered in the AMT Shelby Drag Team mentioned previously in this story. Don't be confused by the Indy nomenclature—it's got nothing to do with the annual milk-and-bricks, roundy-round event but everything to do with the fabled NHRA U.S. Nationals at Indianapolis Raceway Park. This kit depicts a typical independent Chevy match race team, likely running in Modified Production or Factory Experimental. Sharp eyes will recognize the Hurst Performance Clinic banner atop the background tent, a nod to Jack "Doc" Watson's ever-present Hurst repair facility at all major race events. The altered wheelbase Nova kit has been re-released separately as the Rat Packer, though the combination shown here has not been re-releasedyet. Fingers remain crossed.

Chevelle Drag Team



Yet another all-Chevy altered-wheelbase racer and tow car combo, the AMT Chevelle Drag Team (kit T360-300) was released in 1968 and included a '63 Impala tow car, supercharged '65 Chevelle match racer, and the same trailer used in the Indy Drag Combo and Shelby Drag Team. The mouthwatering Al Schrank art depicts fictional "Time Machine" graphics on the altered wheelbase Chevelle, though it was likely inspired by Malcolm Durham's real-life Strip Blazer. To get its altered-wheelbase body shell, AMT permanently modified the tooling for its '65 Chevelle annual kit, a practice common to the other AMT altered-wheelbase model-car kits (which included a '65 Falcon, '65 Mustang 2+2, '66 Cyclone, '63 Nova, '63 Tempest and '64 Olds Cutlass). Unlike the Falcon,

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Mustang, Cyclone, Nova, and Tempest, the "funnied" Chevelle sub-kit has never been re-released by AMT.

Dodge Revellion



The Dodge Revellion (kit H-1265-200) was one of Revell's first Funny Car kits, debuting in 1967 with the Miss Deal '53 Studebaker flip-top FC. Though Revell Funny Car kits of the early '70s were based on realworld machines (Jungle Jim's Camaro and Vega, Gene Snow's Charger, the Pisano and Matsubara Vega, Mickey Thompson's Grand Am, and Ed McCulloch's Demon, etc.), the Revellion—and Miss Deal—were pure fantasy. Though the altered-wheelbase, flip-top Miss Deal Studebaker was tooled from scratch as a Funny Car, the Revellion is a great example of existing tooling that was hastily repurposed to grab a chunk of the growing market for FC kits. By combining an existing front-engine dragster kit, the unaltered body shell from the '62 Dodge Dart annual kit, and some wild graphics, Revell efficiently conjured this exciting offering. Its rail-dragster-with-a-body-on-top theme was likely inspired by the Don Garlits/Emery Cook Swamp Rat 9, a fiberglass '66 Dart roadster perched atop a fuel-rail chassis.

Mustang 427 Funny Car



In 1968, AMT took its obsolete '65 Mustang 2+2 kit body, altered the wheelbase, and merged it with a special platform chassis to get the Mustang 427 Funny Car (kit 6753-150). Packing a Hilborn-injected 427 SOHC engine backed by a four-speed and leaf-sprung 9-inch rear axle, the end result is cool but not very faithful to reality. Unlike Chrysler altered-wheelbase factory Funny Cars, Ford's '66 FX strategy involved stretching the wheelbase and getting the car as close to the ground as possible. The resulting stretch-nose FX Mustangs (as campaigned by legends like Gas Ronda, Bill Lawton, Tommy Grove, and others) were low and sleek, not high and jaunty like this kit. That said, AMT's freestyle take on a Mustang match-racer pushes all the right buttons.
